PURPOSE OF POLICY

To clarify and prioritize within budget limitations the areas in which dust control suppressants may be applied on MD controlled roadways in ongoing efforts to ensure public safety, quality of life, and to realize road maintenance cost reductions.

POLICY STATEMENT

- 1. The MD dust control program is regulated by the dust control policy. Additional application of dust control products are available to residents on a user pay basis.
 - a. No warranty is provided for dust control. The person requesting the service shall be charged a fee, as per C-FIN-529, Fees and Charges, each time the dust control product is applied on the road.
- 2. Dust control is meant to control dust on the roadways, not to eliminate it completely. When dust control products are applied, the substance will adhere to the gravel surface. These products retain moisture (from rain, humidity), which weighs down the dust particles, making them less likely to become airborne after a vehicle has passed over the area.

DEFINITIONS

- 3. For the purpose of this policy, the following definitions shall apply:
 - a. "<u>MD</u>" shall mean and refer to the Municipal District of Pincher Creek No. 9.

CONDITIONS FOR SERVICE

- 4. The MD will not apply dust suppression product to private property and will only apply dust suppression product for corporate entities with Council approval.
- 5. Companies having a road use agreement will be required to control dust with water as and when required. The Public Works Superintendent will monitor their activities and dust levels.

- 6. Dust suppression on roads using water only is at the discretion of the Public Works Superintendent.
- 7. The primary dust control suppressants of the MD will be Lignosulfonate, MG 30 (magnesium), and Calcium Chloride. All dust abatements will meet the approved requirements of the Alberta Transportations highway Maintenance specifications. Lignosulfonate is the primary dust control product of the MD and is the only product used on public roads within the MD by Public Works, alternate products approved for use include MG30 (magnesium), and Calcium Chloride.
 - a. Testing of new products will be conducted annually to determine if they provide a more durable surface, or are more cost effective.
- 8. Public Works will apply dust control to the roads in Schedule "A" to Policy C-PW-009 as approved by Council annually prior to doing the MD's arterial roads.
 - a. Private requests and other areas to ensure the roads with the most traffic are done prior to lower use roads.
- 9. Residents who are looking to have their dust suppression done prior to the MD completing the roads identified in Schedule "A" can contract approved service providers to apply one of the approved products.
- 10. Prior to residential dust control being applied, the resident must fill out and sign an agreement to purchase materials or services form.
 - a. To allow for product ordering and timelines, agreements shall be completed prior to the application deadline of May 1 each year. No service is guaranteed for requests received after this date.
- 11. In order to allow for timelines for work, Public Works may utilize alternate service providers. Approved service providers include:
 - a. Grumpy's Landscaping Ltd.
 - b. Sinnott Farm Services Ltd.

RECOMMENDATION:

That Council approves the new excavator in 2020, through the Equipment Reserve (6-12-0-752-6740).

- The purchase of a new 2021 excavator with a mulcher attachment for \$390,000, was presented to Council Committee on October 13, 2020. The purchase was "approved in principle" during this meeting for the 2021 budget.
- The Calgary excavator will have a 5 year, 5000 premier warranty with travel and will be the same size, make and model as the 2021 excavator.
- Regardless of when the excavator is purchased, the \$40,000 purchase for the new mulcher attachment will remain as outlined in the 2021 proposed capital budget.

Option 1:

The MD has become aware a new 2020 excavator is available for purchase in Calgary for \$315,000. It is available for delivery as early as mid-November 2020. It was purchased at a time when the exchange rate was better than what we see today. Therefore, if the MD purchases this excavator, it would result in approximately \$35,000 in savings than the 2021 proposed budget.

Option 2:

If the MD proceeds with the excavator purchase outlined in the 2021 proposed budget, Administration will not make this purchase until **after January 1, 2021**. The MD would pass on the favourable purchase price opportunity from Calgary. Additionally, under this option, the MD would be unable to use the excavator in the first half of 2021. This equipment will come from the United States factory, adding another 3-4 months in timing for delivery.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:
Purchasing the new excavator in 2020 will cost \$315,000 but will result in cost savings of \$35,000.

BACKGROUND:

On October 15, 2020, the Crowsnest Heritage Initiative Society made application to Alberta Transportation for approval to erect a 4'x8' private sign within the Highway No. 3 right-of-way, at the roadside turnout by the Burmis Tree (*Attachment No. 1*).

On October 29th, 2020, Alberta Transportation approved the permit with conditions. Condition No. 1 being that "This permit is issued subject to the approval of the Municipal District of Pincher Creek."

The same day, the MD received an email from Fred Bradley with the Crowsnest Heritage Initiative Society, requesting that the MD give its approval for the placement of a sign by the Burmis Tree (Attachment No. 2).

The MD's planning advisor states that he has no concerns given the content of either the Intermunicipal Development Plan with the Crowsnest Pass or the Burmis Lundbreck Corridor Area Structure Plan.






Required, 55.10(h) may apply, stating that signs or billboards erected by a public authority, public agency or public department do not require a permit.





General

The following are general requirements for installing privately owned signs within the highway right-of-way.

These guidelines apply to the following categories of signs:

- Community Information Signs (e.g., Radio Station Sign, Rural Crime Watch Sign, Citizens on Patrol Sign)
- Public Awareness Signs (e.g., Wildfire Prevention Signs)
- General Information Signs (e.g., Institution Sign).

These guidelines do <u>not</u> apply to TODS and LOGOS signing programs.

Provincial Authority and Sign Approval Process

Alberta Transportation, through legislation, maintains control of all signs:

- within the limits of the right-of-way of any provincial highway.
- within the development control zone, 300 metres on either side of the limit of a controlled highway, or within 800 metres of a highway intersection. This does not apply minor provincial highways, as defined in the Roadside Management Classification Map.

Guidelines for installing signs within the area of controlled development are <u>not</u> included in this document.

All privately owned signs placed within the highway rightof-way require written approval from the nearest Alberta Transportation district office.

Sign Application

An individual or organization wishing to obtain approval for the placement of a private sign (e.g., Radio Station sign, Rural Crime Watch sign) must submit an application to one of the Alberta Transportation district offices. A listing of all district offices within the province is provided on the following webpage:

Applications are made on forms established and approved by the department.

General instructions and application form samples are available on the Alberta Transportation website (at the address provided above).

The sign application (sign design and proposed location) is reviewed by a district office to ensure compliance with the departmental standard specifications and provisions.

Sign Approval

After reviewing a sign application, a district office may issue a Letter of Approval.

A Letter of Approval is a document that binds the sign proponent and the Department through mutual agreement for the use and placement of a sign.

The document includes conditions that must be met before a sign can be installed on a highway and requirements for the installation and maintenance of the sign.

Installation and Maintenance

The sign applicant can choose one of the following two methods to handle the fabrication and delivery of signs:

Managed by a private contractor.

The sign applicant is responsible for arranging with a private contractor to fabricate signs in accordance with the provincial sign standards and specifications. Signs are delivered for installation to a location specified by the applicable department maintenance contractor.

 Managed by the applicable department maintenance contractor. The department maintenance contractor arranges for the fabrication and delivery of signs within the highway right-of-way.

All signs, including those delivered by a private contractor, must be installed by the applicable department maintenance contractor. This practice guarantees compliance with the department installation requirements and ensures that traffic accommodation procedures are followed.

The sign applicant will normally be responsible for any subsequent replacement of signs and supporting structures, as well as any sign repairs, with the option of using either a private contractor or the department maintenance contractor to complete the required maintenance activities.

All costs associated with fabricating, installing and maintaining signs will normally be the responsibility of the sign applicant.

The department monitors signs within the highway rightof-way to ensure the safety of motorists and provision of an aesthetically pleasant environment.

Excessive or Unsightly Signs

The department, through the legislation of the Traffic Safety Act, may take the following actions:

- · request the sign owner remove obsolete signs
- remove or relocate signs which prevent a vehicle from having a clear and unobstructed view of the roadway.

Traffic Accommodation

Traffic accommodation is required when work is performed within the highway right- of-way in order to provide the motoring public with adequate warning and to protect workers within the work area.

The maintenance contractor responsible for installing signs within the highway right-of- way in a given contract maintenance area will be responsible for traffic accommodation during sign installation.

When maintenance activities are performed by a sign owner, traffic accommodation procedures for short duration projects must be followed as outlined in the *Alberta Traffic Accommodation in Work Zones* manual (available on the department website). It may be beneficial to develop a traffic accommodation strategy consisting of a plan and/or written procedure to address site specific issues.

Safety Considerations

Large sign structures located within the roadside area are hazardous to errant vehicles. Placement of signs outside the clear zone minimizes the probability of a vehicle reaching the structure. Use of breakaway structures or use of protecting barriers can also minimize vehicle impact.

Guidelines for roadside and barrier design, and clear zone requirements are included in the department's *Highway Geometric Design Guide*; Section C.5 entitled "Roadside Design". Clear zone distances are showed in Table C.5.2a on page C-38 of the *Highway Geometric Design Guide*.

Signs that are too large or located too close to the roadway may also obstruct motorist sightlines at intersections, curves, ramps or other unusual highway sections.

Guidelines for the placement of signs within the highway right-of-way have been developed and are available on the Alberta Transportation website.

BACKGROUND:

As required by the Municipal Government Act, a municipality must annually prepare a tax arrears list showing the parcels of land on which there are tax arrears for more than one year at March 31st. Any parcel of land that is shown on the 2019 tax arrears list which remains in arrears as of March 31, 2020 must be offered for sale at public auction. When there is a need for a public auction, Council is required to set an auction date and a minimum sale price for the properties.

Currently, there is one property on the MD's 2019 tax arrears list. Taxservice has been in contact with the owner. The property owner has up until the property is declared sold to pay the tax arrears and avoid the auction.

Administration would like to schedule the auction date for Thursday, January 28, 2021 at 10:00am in the Administration Building – Council Chambers, which will be advertised as per the MGA. Council must set a minimum bid price. Our assessor has provided his opinion on the value of the property at \$170,000.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

- 1. A parcel of land offered for sale may be redeemed by payment of all arrears, penalties and costs by guaranteed funds at any time until the property is declared sold.
- 2. Each parcel of land offered for sale will be subject to a reserve bid and to the reservations and conditions contained in the existing certificate of title.
- 3. The lands are being offered for sale on an "as is, where is" basis, and the municipality makes no representation and gives no warranty whatsoever as to the state of the parcel nor its suitability for any intended use by the successful bidder.
- 4. The auctioneer, councillors, the chief administrative officer and the designated officers and employees of the municipality must not bid or buy any parcel of land offered for sale, unless directed by the municipality to do so on behalf of the municipality.
- 5. The purchaser of the property will be responsible for property taxes for the current year.
- 6. The purchaser will be required to execute a sale agreement in form and substance provided by the municipality.
- 7. The successful purchaser must, at the time of sale, make payment in cash, certified cheque or bank draft payable to the municipality as follows:
 - a. The full purchase price if it is \$10,000 or less; OR
 - b. If the purchase price is greater than \$10,000, the purchaser must provide a nonrefundable deposit in the amount of \$10,000 and the balance of the purchase price must be paid within 20 days of the sale.
- 8. GST will be collected on all properties subject to GST.
- 9. The risk of the property lies with the purchaser immediately following the auction.
- 10. The purchaser is responsible for obtaining vacant possession.
- 11. The purchaser will be responsible for registration of the transfer including registration fees.

During the current PCESC budget review a question was asked concerning the low amount of current reserves.

Prior to the formation of the Commission the Town and the MD were to retain reserves for purchase of capital items for PCES A needed.

When the Commission was formed, the Membership Agreement addressed the need of the Commission to manage its own reserves and required the Town and the MD to transfer those reserves held by them to the Commission (section 8. e).

This did not happen for various reasons. The actual amount held by each jurisdiction was never revealed other than an assurance it was being held.

Over the years there have been various positions taken by the PCESC directors for funding the reserve with the result we only levied to address the immediate need to make a capital project as the reserves were still held by the two jurisdictions.

In some cases, capital purchases were only partially levied, using PCESC reserves to make up the difference.



Following the direction provided in previous years I have requested the amount needed to make the capital purchases identified as well as the amount our auditors have shown as depreciation.

I would like to have a policy to define funding the PCESC reserve understanding that the Members would need to commit to supporting that policy.

I would like to express my opinion that the Grassy Mountain Coal Mine operation should be disallowed.




I hope you can agree that this mine should be opposed for these and other reasons. Thank you very much for your attention.






Balanced Cross Section

Grassy Mountain in Crowsnest Pass



Route selection

TC Energy employs a systematic and thorough route selection process during prospecting using a variety of considerations, such as:

- desktop studies
- helicopter surveys
- ground verification and on-the-ground field survey
- engineering, geotechnical and environmental field studies
- co-location of the pipeline along existing disturbances and corridors to minimize new footprint

Route selection takes into account the objectives of minimizing the total route length or land requirements, meeting applicable regulatory requirements and reducing the environmental footprint, while carefully assessing overall construction complexity and our ability to meet customer needs.

Once a route is proposed, feedback received through stakeholder, landowner and Indigenous engagement informs the assessment of proposed routes and sites.

What to expect during and after construction

The planning that goes into the construction and operation of our pipeline projects reflects commitments we've made and conditions we receive during the regulatory review process. We track and report our progress on regulatory conditions with the CER and follow up on the commitments we've made to honour the relationships we've built with Indigenous groups, communities and landowners.

During pipeline construction there is an increase in traffic in and around the project area as well as heavy equipment onsite for earthworks, material handling/hauling, welding and testing. We adhere to construction plans and the Environmental Protection Plan to ensure that the impacts of construction activities on communities are minimized.

Many of our projects include the use of temporary work space and, where required, workforce accommodations purpose-built to support construction. Where our plans include these features, we begin the conversation with potentially affected stakeholders early on to hear and understand community interests.

Access to-and-from site is planned based on a number of factors including finding the safest and most efficient routes to our work site, existing infrastructure, new infrastructure required to support construction, and municipal planning. Access planning is refined throughout project development and final plans are communicated to communities prior to work starting.

Once construction is completed, the impacted land area including our temporary work space and workforce accommodation areas is reclaimed to an equivalent land capability so that it can support various uses such as wildlife habitat or agricultural purposes, similar to the ability that existed previously. Measures are taken to prevent topsoil/surface material loss from wind and water erosion and to establish a vegetative cover native to the surrounding vegetation and land use. After the facilities are constructed, there will be minimal traffic associated with ongoing operations and maintenance.

On freehold lands, landowners have the right to fully use and enjoy the right of way subject to the terms of the right-of-way agreement, and CER and Damage Prevention Regulations. To provide public safety and to protect property and the environment, written consent from TC Energy is required for certain activities on the pipeline right of way and within the 30-metre prescribed area. These activities include but are not limited to: operating motor vehicles or mobile equipment, reducing or adding soil cover and any excavation or ground disturbance. Stakeholders may contact TC Energy with at least 10 working days' notice to apply for written consent at writtenconsent.transcanada.com. After written consent has been received, request a locate by visiting ClickBeforeYouDig. com or calling the appropriate provincial One-Call Centre.

Ensuring our pipelines are safe

Our safety program starts before construction. We use only highquality materials, the latest proven technologies and industryleading practices to ensure the integrity of our pipelines before they go in the ground. We are a leader in North America in the use of automatic welding and ultrasonic testing technologies to construct pipelines. These technologies ensure high quality welds are made and every weld is inspected by qualified independent inspectors during construction. Prior to placing a pipeline in service, it is hydrostatically tested with water at a higher pressure than it will see during operations. In addition, pipeline inspection tools with high resolution sensors are run through the pipeline to check for any other irregularities prior to flowing natural gas.

Once operational, we use state-of-the-art leak detection systems, safety features such as shut-off valves and provide highly specialized training for people working on our assets. Our pipeline systems are monitored 24 hours a day, 365 days a year by trained operators in our Operations Control Centres who manage the most sophisticated pipeline monitoring equipment and technology available. Our industry-leading asset integrity programs manage our pipeline and facilities for their entire life cycle to ensure they provide safe and reliable energy to consumers throughout North America.

Emergency preparedness and response

Our goal is to ensure that our pipeline and energy facilities operate safely every day and that the public, our employees, and the environment are protected during the unlikely event of incident involving our assets. All TC Energy safety initiatives are designed to advance one goal: Zero is Real. We are proud to have an industry leading safety record and continue to work towards our goal of zero safety incidents. Being prepared for the rare cases when something does go wrong is part of the commitment to ensuring the safety of the communities where we live and operate.

At the first sign of any potential issue on our pipeline systems, our control centre operators can stop the flow of product through the pipeline in minutes and investigate. If an irregular condition is detected, pipeline operators immediately dispatch emergency personnel to the scene to investigate. The pipeline is not restarted until it has been confirmed on site by qualified personnel that it is safe to do so.

In the unlikely event of an incident, all our assets have specific Emergency Response Plans that outlines the steps we'll take to respond. Our Emergency Preparedness and Response team is focused on quickly and effectively responding to emergencies and mitigating any impacts that may have occurred to public safety, property or the environment in a timely manner.

If there is an incident, we work closely with authorities, emergency responders and the media to ensure local residents are safe and aware of the situation.

The MD have been fantastic at facilitating this process by supplying written quotations and other pertinent information to make this project shovel ready.
